For the academic year 2015/16, Primrose Hill was allocated £30,800

### **Impact of the above spending:**

Overall school attendance remained high at 97.4%. Attendance for all pupils/FSM group was above the national figure for all pupils and no group had low attendance. Persistent absence for all pupils/FSM group was well below the national figure for all pupils and no group had high persistent absence.

For KS1 disadvantaged pupils, attainment of at least the expected standard in all subjects for all EYFS development groups was above national figures for other pupils.

For KS1 disadvantaged pupils, attainment of greater depth in all subjects for all EYFS development groups was close to or above national figures for other pupils.

£2000 of funding for school visits and extra-curricular activities was used to provide educational visits free or at subsidised costs for disadvantaged pupils. 100% of pupils attended at least two curriculum enrichment visits per year group, including residential activities in Upper Key Stage Two.

Three families were supported individually by the Children's Centre Best Start Outreach worker when faced with crises. Pupils' attendance, achievement and attainment all remained high during this time. More generally, all families were signposted to activities and support groups operating locally that would offer support in areas such as reading, writing, parenting etc. Due to funding being cut to finance many of the facilities and services on offer from the Children's Centre, and having seen the positive impact that was provided last year, the school will be employing its own family support worker for ½ day per week during the 2016/17 academic year.

Additional TA hours were funded to support pupils in danger of not making good progress. Increased hours were allocated into classes with a higher number of pupils in receipt of pupil premium funding and pupils made at least expected progress.

The progress of pupils attending the HLTA Nurture Group was outstanding, with many making better than expected progress. Behaviour of pupils improved greatly. Pupils attending this group were given opportunities to develop core key skills, whilst engaging in social and emotional activities to enhance social skills and increase self-confidence.

All pupils received termly 'Kidsafe' lessons, raising awareness of PSHE and ensuring that all pupils were aware of support available in difficult situations.

The school was awarded 'Established' standard in the Quality in Study Support (QiSS) quality mark standard, recognising the excellent provision for extra-curricular activities on offer for all pupils, with particular focus being given to supporting disadvantaged pupils in attending clubs. Feedback from the Lancashire Parental Attitude Questionnaire indicates many positive comments regarding curricular and extra-curricular support for pupils. The school was rated in the top 5% in Lancashire for positive responses in over 1/3 of satisfaction categories surveyed.
